Candidates interested in returning to the workplace full or part time can apply to the following SCSEP programs:

Age Works Computer Training

Provides basic and intermediate instruction in MS Office Suite (Word, Excel and PowerPoint). Candidates must have ninth grade reading and math skills (tested) and previous work experience.

Food Emporium and Riese Restaurant Training Center

Prepares trainees for jobs in various industries, including retail, sales and other customer service fields. Applicants must have seventh grade reading and math skills (tested).

A 20-hour per week community service internship is required. Must meet low-income eligibility, be 55 or older, unemployed and a New York City resident.
